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#### Hajj FRAUD: ICPC Arrests LG Chairman's SA

he Independent Corrupt Practices and Other Related Offences Commission (ICPC), Kaduna Zonal office has arrested one Sani Dauda Hassan, Special Adviser (SA) to the Chairman of Giwa Local Government on Hajj, for defrauding nine people over Hajj pilgrimage.

The suspect was said to have collected the sum of N6,382,000 from the victims who he had assured of Hajj seats.

The fraudulent scheme began when one Musa Abdullahi a resident of Giwa Local Government paid the sum of N650,000 to the suspect with the aim of securing a hajj seat. Abdullahi later introduced Hajiya Halima and 7 others—to the suspect who also wanted Hajj seats. But they were all defrauded of their money because neither the Hajj seats nor their money materialized.

The suspect however was only able to supply original Hajj kits i.e. uniform and bags to the victims which he claimed to have obtained from the Pilgrims' Welfare Board in Kaduna.

Under interrogation by operatives of the ICPC, he confessed to committing the offence but pleaded that he was a first-offender. He will be charged to court as soon as investigations are concluded.

## ICPC Arraigns Cameroonian with Nigerian Passport

he Independent Corrupt Practices and Other Related Offences Commission (ICPC) has arraigned one Cameroonian, Mr. Tumbu Formaka Bartholomew, before Justice Ishaq Bello of Maitama High Court, Abuja.

Mr. Bartholomew was brought before the court on a two-count charge of criminal conspiracy and making false statement to officials of the Nigeria Immigration Services in order to obtain a Nigerian Passport.

The offences are contrary to and punishable under Section 25 (1) (b) of the Corrupt Practices and Other Related Offences Act 2000.

Mr. Bartholomew is accused of conspiring with one Etim Effiong (now at large) to mislead immigration officials into believing that he was a Nigerian from Ikom, Cross River State which facilitated his obtaining a Nigerian International Passport.

Investigations carried out by officers of the Commission revealed that the accused person was in possession of a Nigerian Passport even though he is a national of Cameroon and has not been granted Nigerian citizenship.

The accused admitted that Mr. Effiong Etim, now in Thailand, helped him to get the passport by making a false statement that he was a Nigerian from Cross River State.

Mr. Bartholomew was among the suspects arrested after one Obazee Osadolor for whom a visa was fraudulently obtained, was arrested as he was trying to board a plane to the United States of America from Lagos.

Mr. Bartholomew has pleaded not guilty to the charge and is being remanded in prison custody pending the hearing of his application for bail.

The Chairman of the Independent Corrupt Practices and Other Related Offences Commission (ICPC), Mr. Ekpo Nta has said that the Commission is set to prosecute fraudsters who posed as officers of the Nigerian Customs Service (NCS) on the internet to auction cars to members of the public.

Mr. Nta who made the disclosure during an investigative Public Hearing on improper land allocation, land racketeering and land swapping in the FCT, organized by the House of Representatives in Abuja said the ICPC has arrested some of the fraudsters that have collected huge sums of money

from Nigerians in exchange for cars that were never supplied.

He said, "There are some people that pose on the internet as buyers and sellers of cars, especially cars seized by the Nigerian Customs. These people invite unsuspecting Nigerians to pay

money into their accounts for the cars. We have made substantial arrests and we are going to prosecute them to serve as a deterrent to others."

He enjoined Nigerians to be wary of doing business without seeking the advice of professionals. In his words: "We should learn to be professional in our dealings. If a lawyer was mandated, he would go and find out the authenticity of the business before any investment could be made."

#### On Recent Seizure of 61 Houses and Plots

The Chairman who also spoke on the recent seizure of 61 houses and over one thousand hectares of land by the ICPC from a Nigerian, who posed as a staff of the Nigerian Security and Civil Defense Corps (NSCDC) to defraud members of the public through sales of land added that the Commission would ensure that the culprit, now at large was brought to book soon.

He gave breakdown of the seizures to include, 61 housing units, which include 40 units of two-bedroom flats, 21 units of three-bedroom flats and one duplex all located in an estate in Abuja.

"Six companies were involved in the fraud. We have blocked all the accounts of the companies. We have written to all the agencies concerned so that the 1795.58 hectares of land and the properties seized would not be sold to a third party until the matter is resolved", he added.

Mr. Nta also absolved the NSCDC of being part of the fraud, and commended the Commandant General of the Corps, Dr. Ade Abolurin for reporting the fraud to the Commission. He urged other government agencies to take a cue from the NSCDC

boss.

He said, "From our preliminary findings, it is not the NSCDC as an agency that was involved. What has happened is that the officials used NSCDC to give credence to the fraud. The Commandant-General of the NSCDC came to my office in May, 2013 drawing my attention to an

unsavory practice regarding the selling of lands in the FCT and Nasarawa State.

"It is rare for public officers to willingly go and report anomalies in their establishments to another agency. It is a commendable thing. The ICPC Act provides that such infractions, when they occur should be reported to the Commission."

Chairman of the Committee, Hon. Bimbo Daramola lauded the Commission for its role in taming corruption in Nigeria.

He lamented that over 186 Nigerians had been defrauded by the land fraudster through a company called DANEMY Nigeria Limited in a housing scheme that was orchestrated in the guise of an NSCDC housing scheme.

He asked if the victims of the fraud could get reprieves as soon as possible. But Mr. Nta, in response, said the court would decide that, adding that the Commission would ensure that the victims do not suffer unnecessarily by speedily concluding investigations.

The ICPC Chairman revealed that the Commission was in full custody of all the seized properties and that constant monitoring was in place to ensure that they were not tampered with.

### ICPC unveils Whistle-Blower/ Witness Protection Policy

Whistle-blowers and witnesses who are often victimized by their superiors for reporting corrupt acts will soon find succour.

This is against the backdrop of a whistle-blower and witness protection policy which the ICPC will soon introduce in order to protect its informants and witnesses from victimization.

The policy is expected to boost the fight against corruption since such whistle-blowers would be shielded from being victimized and would feel safe after reporting any acts of corruption.

A consultative meeting which was recently held for the staff of Independent Corrupt Practices and Other Related Offences Commission (ICPC) and other agencies at the Commission's headquarters in Abuja and was attended by officers of various government departments and agencies including the ICPC provided a forum for the disclosure of the new whistle-blower policy by the ICPC.

Declaring the meeting open, the Secretary to the Commission, Mr. Elvis Oglafa, on behalf of the Commission's Chairman, noted the seriousness with which the officers of the agencies embraced the new dimension and approach to empower anti-corruption agencies to fortify their efforts against corruption. He reiterated the ICPC's resolve to do everything within its powers to bring down the menace of corruption in the country.

Also, Mrs. Christiana Onuogu (HOD Legal), in her remark defined "whistle-blower" to mean a person/persons who give information on an act of corruption and most times suffer victimization when they make such reports.

The policy, she said, is not a bill but an interim measure to help in corruption combat, and solicited for cooperation of other agencies to help in this fight and to also let people know that they can be protected if they become whistle-blowers or witnesses.

In his presentation of the policy titled "Whistle-Blower and Witness Protection Policy of ICPC", Mr. Akeem Lawal (Acting Deputy Commissioner, Legal) lamented that whistle-blower/witness victimization has become "an issue in the society and if not checked will retard the fight against

corrupt practices." The policy, he said, "is a child of necessity in ICPC with regards to ICPC Act 2000, Section 64 (Protection of informers and information) & Section 70 (Powers of the Commission to make rules); thus the basis is to ensure that there is a policy on ground to protect the informants, information and witnesses."

Mr. Lawal further called on all the participants to make their observations, suggestions and contributions to strengthen the policy.

#### Law Reform Commission Proposes Amendment to . Corrupt Practices and Other Related Offences Act 2000 ... SAN says ICPC name a Misnomer

Commission (NLRC) has proposed amendments to the Corrupt Practices and Other Related Offences Act 2000, which established the Independent Corrupt Practices and Other Related Offences Commission (ICPC). To this end, a workshop was organized by the NLRC recently in Abuja, aimed at brainstorming on the proposed amendments to some provisions of the law that are fundamental flaws

that have retarded the smooth operations of the anti-graft Commission.


Speaking at the event, the Chairman Nigerian Law Reform Commission, Justice Umaru A. Kalgo who was represented by Professor Cyprian O. Okonkwo, said that the Nigerian Law Reform Commission has carefully examined the provisions of the ICPC Act and has made proposals to amend some of its provisions. He urged all participants to offer useful contributions towards the improvement of the act.

Declaring the workshop open, Attorney-General of the Federation and Minister of Justice, Mr. Mohammed Bello, who spoke through Professor Deji Adekunle, said that the reform exercise was in conformity with the good governance/anti-corruption measures of the transformation agenda of the present administration.

In this regard, he said, a reexamination of our existing laws on corruption has become necessary to bring them in tandem with new challenges.

ICPC Name a Misnomer, says SAN Mr. Ola Olanipekun in his paper presentation, "Proposals for the Reform of the Independent Corrupt Practices and Other Related Offences Commission Act, 2000 (The ICPC Act)" among many others suggested an amendment to the name of the Commission.

In his words, "According to Section

3(1) ICPC Act 2000, "There is hereby established a Commission to be known as the Independent Corrupt Practices and Other Related Offences Commission."

Ola said, "A reflection over the name of the Commission established by the act would indicate that something is missing. The Commission was established to fight corrupt practices and NOT FOR corrupt practices as the name suggests. Every time I read the signboard - Independent Corrupt Practices Commission, I become more convinced that we may be sending a wrong signal that the Commission is established for corrupt practices.

He therefore suggested that Section 3(1) should be amended to read: "There is hereby established a Commission to be known as the Independent Anti-Corrupt Practices and Other Related Offences Commission".

Other sections highlighted for amendment were Sections 6 and 27. Section 6 (a) empowers the Commission to receive and investigate any report of commission of offence while Section 27 (1) specifies that the report may be oral or written.

Speaking further, Mr. Olanipekun said, "It would seem that the Commission must wait to receive a report or complaint before the enormous powers of arrest and investigation conferred on it can be activated. If no report is made, the Commission looks on, while elaborate drama of nauseating facts, accusation and counter-accusation of monumental fraud are played out, even on national television."

Therefore, he suggested that "In tandem with duties obligated under Sub Sections (b) to (F), the Commission should be able to, where reasonable grounds exist for suspecting the commission of an offence invite or arrest such persons for investigation and probable prosecution. It is thereby suggested that

an amendment be made to Section 6 mandating such duty and granting all enabling powers to so do, if none exists."

Other issues touched include protection and reward of informant, composition of membership of the Commission, qualification of members of the Commission among others.

Chairman of the ICPC, Mr. Ekpo Nta, who was present at the workshop expressed that the anti-corruption agency was not established out of international pressure.

Mr. Nta said, "There are two ways countries would like to put anticorruption agencies in place. The first would be that they had come under severe international pressure to do so, and they need that reaction to set up an anti-corruption body to satisfy international pressure.

"The second aspect has to do with the people deciding that corruption is a problem and must be tackled. And out of their own internal resolve and volition set up anti-corruption agencies. It was in this light that the ICPC came into being four years before the advent of the United Nations Convention against Corruption (UNCAC)."

Speaking further, he stated that the Commission had gone ahead to change the situation of the country. "So we are on Twitter, on Facebook, we have tollfree lines and we are getting a lot of information on these toll-free lines." he added.



The Chairman of the Independent Corrupt Practices and Other Related Offences Commission (ICPC), Barr. Ekpo Nta, has said that Nigeria through the ICPC and other anticorruption agencies has taken a bold step to tackle the scourge of corruption in the country.

The Chairman, who was represented by a board member, Mr. Isa Ozi Salami, stated this in a paper titled "Implication of Corruption for prosecution of the operators, National Development: How To provision of toll-free lines for level of ethical standards and Checkmate Corruption" at the reporting corrupt practices; systems National Retreat on Anti-Corruption Ethics and Transparency for Public and Private Institutions in Nigeria held in Kaduna and organized by the Economic Monitoring and Policy Development Centre, Abuja.

He argued that Nigeria, by enacting the Corrupt Practices and Other Related Offences Act 2000 and the Economic and Financial Crimes Act 2002, had promulgated its anticorruption legislation five years earlier than the international community because the United Nation's Convention on Anti-Corruption (UNCAC) which was adopted in 2003 by the UN General Assembly only came into force in 2005.

## Openness, Accountability foster Anti-Corruption -ICPC Chairman

The Chairman of the Independent Corrupt Practices and Other Related Offences Commission (ICPC), Mr. Ekpo Nta, has re-affirmed the Commission's commitment to waging war on corruption with every means available to it. Mr. Nta, represented by Alhaji Ozi Isa Salami, an honorable member of the ICPC, was speaking at a Two-Day Presidential Retreat on Awareness of the Provisions of the Fiscal Responsibility Act. 2007 tagged: "Fiscal Responsibility as a Strategy for National Transformation" which was held recently in Calabar.

Mr. Nta in a paper titled: "Accountability and Transparency in Fiscal Operations" noted that the value of openness and accountability is that they foster public discussions with various shades of stakeholders.

The ICPC Chairman recalled that allocations from the Federation Account were being published in the print media starting from 2003 by the Federal Government, through the Federal Ministry of Finance, and that this was years before the *Fiscal Responsibility and Freedom of Information Acts* were enacted.

He revealed that in reaction to that publication, ICPC produced a fiscal responsibility documentary, in collaboration with UNDP, to enlighten citizens and civil societies on how to engage and monitor their respective local government budgeting processes and public expenditure.

He however regretted that some "activists have ended up using the information to blackmail the local government authorities for their private share or settlement, instead of acting as whistleblowers".

Mr. Nta added that "When some revenue-generating agencies fail to declare and remit truthfully the amounts of revenue generated to the Federation Account as NEITI audit reports have shown, ICPC ensured and will continue to ensure compliance by defaulting agencies until there is total compliance.

"However, there is need to streamline some of their laws to remove ambiguity as to what should be retained and how what is retained is spent", he concluded.

Mr. Oglafa said that good governance is something everyone advocates for. And that ICPC believes good governance can be used as a tool to eliminate corruption.



The Vice-Chancellor of the Federal University, Lokoja, Prof. Abdulmumin Hassan Rafindadi, has enjoined the Independent Corrupt Practices and Other Related Offences Commission (ICPC) to extend the anti-corruption crusade to the nonformal sector.

Prof. Rafindadi, who was represented by the Registrar of the university, Hajiya Habiba Adeiza, was speaking at the inauguration of the Anti-Corruption and Transparency monitoring Unit (ACTU) for the institution. He argued that corruption was not restricted to the public or formal sector but also thrived in the non-formal sector of the society

The don who lauded the ICPC for the launch of anti-corruption crusade in the institution, described the drive as another milestone in arresting the scourge of corruption pervading and permeating national and domestic lives of Nigerians.

He submitted thus:"the non-formal groups should be mobilized to key into this drive. These may include farmers, religious and artisan groups. It (ICPC) should also encourage setting up anti-corruption clubs in primary and secondary schools. This will help in nurturing a generation better minded in attitudes and virtues."

The VC looked forward to building a formidable institution through a sustained partnership with the Commission. The eight-man ACTU inaugurated by the Zonal Head, Kogi Zonal Office of ICPC, Mr. Henry O. Emore, were: Abdullahi Muhammed Bello of the vice chancellors office (chairman), Danjuma Jibrin Isah, internal audit unit (member), Adefokun S. Idowu, Student Affairs Division (Member), Dr. Adeshina Olanrewaju Lawal, Dept. of English and Lit-studies (member), Mr. Kizito Musa, Dept of Geology (member), Uche Onyedi, Bursary department (member) and Shamaki Nuhu, Snr. Asst. Registrar (secretary).

While presenting a paper entitled: "Establishment, Role and Status of

ACTUs: the Way forward for Effective Performance", Mr. Emore noted that "Since the Commission and its personnel cannot be everywhere, the members of ACTUs are to serve as the eyes and ears of the Commission in their various offices because as insiders, they ought to be privy to information an outsider would not hear."

He spelt out some of the major roles of ACTUs in MDAs streamlined to conform with the duties of the Commission under S.6 of the ICPC Act 2000 to include: act as eyes and ears of the Commission in their organizations; receive and carry out preliminary investigation on any report of corruption made to it; and

report all alleged or reported cases of corruption within their organization to the Commission, with copies sent to the head of that organization. Others are: to report cases involving the Heads or top management staff of their organization to ICPC; examine practices, systems and procedures in their organizations and where such practices and procedures aid corruption, to submit reports to the Head of their organization on how to change these systems and also to send such reports to the ICPC; and to educate internally, officials of their respective organizations through workshops, seminars and lectures.

On the way forward for effective performance of ACTUs, Mr. Emore declared that pursuant to Section 70 of the ICPC Act 2000, the Chairman of

the Commission had made the Standing Orders for the operations of ACTUs in MDAs.

He added that "the provisions of the Standing Orders are very instructive and if members of ACTUs adhere to them a lot would be achieved in the fight against corruption." The Zonal Head, therefore, urged the ACTU members to study the standing orders so that the provisions contained therein would be their guiding principles.

Mr. Emore further declared that "the fight against corruption can only be won if those involved in the crusade have the will to fight it, just as he charged that "as a member of ACTU, you must be a disciplined person and your performance in this institution must be an example for others to follow." He conclusively charged the members to continue to create awareness in the university, and among the generality of the Nigerian public, on the evils of corruption.

In his acceptance speech, the university ACTU chairman, Abdullahi Muhammed Bello, who thanked the ICPC and the VC for the opportunity given members to serve, said "We have accepted this challenge with hope, to do our best." He solicited for the collaboration and assistance from the Vice Chancellor and the university management, members of the university community and the Commission for guidance.

The chairman implored members of ACTU "to maintain a high degree of integrity, honesty and confidentiality in the discharge of their assignment." He hinted that given the fact that "...we did not canvass for this (ACTU membership) and, from information reaching me, each of us was selected for this assignment on his/her merit, we should, therefore, leave no stone unturned in our quest to justify the Vice Chancellor's and indeed, the Commission's confidence in us."

In attendance at the event were the Deans and Heads of Department of the university.

## Corps-Members Told To Imbibe Value of Integrity

ational Youth Corps-members have been enjoined to imbibe the positive values of integrity, honesty, transparency and accountability as they go into the larger society.

This call was made in Lagos by an officer of the Independent Corrupt Practices and Other Related Offences Commission (ICPC), Lagos Zonal Office, Mr. Iroka Sampson, during an interactive session with members of the NYSC/ICPC CDS at the Lagos Office.

Mr. Sampson who lamented that "40 percent of the money budgeted for infrastructure is lost to corruption said there was need for a change of attitude and that the youth must be catalysts for this change."

He therefore advised the youth to go into meaningful ventures that would better their lots rather than engage in social vices such as examination malpractice, fraud, cyber-crime and kidnapping.

While responding to a barrage of questions, Mr. Sampson also dismissed the perception held by some of the youth corps-members that the anti-corruption war is only fought at the lower level of the society while top corrupt government officials are treated as sacred cows, saying that the long arm of the law would catch up with everyone "irrespective of his social or political standing."

In a related development, the ICPC Kaduna Zonal Office has extended its education/public enlightenment campaign to the Batch C 2013 corps members at the NYSC orientation camp in Kaduna. The campaign was to sensitize the youth corps members on the negative effects of corruption on the Nigerian society and how it has retarded the growth of the nation's socio-economic and political development.

In a paper presentation, Mr. Dauda Iliya, got the corpsmembers acquainted with the Commission's core mandate and called on them to be part of the struggle in the "fight against the hydra-headed monster called corruption."


